Executive Officer Lt/C Dick Sorensen, SN --



"Old School" is Cool!

A rarity. An Ohio winter day that was bright and cloudless. Dr. Ralph Newman led 20 plus Ohio State NROTC Midshipmen students out into the bright sunshine. Arrayed around Ralph was the rest of the Columbus Sail and Power Squadron's Navigation teaching team. This was Day Two of teaching the basics of a noon day sight. As the students raised their sextants to take their first reading my mind flashed back to how this all came about.

I had read in the USPS monthly magazine The Ensign that the Naval Academy was reintroducing the study of Celestial Navigation to the midshipmen's curriculum. My initial reaction

was one of shock. How could they not be teaching Celestial? How many times

had I looked dumbly at my computer, TV remote, in-car navigation system and wondered how the damn thing worked, and, even more important, why it wasn't working. What would be the consequences to a

naval warship that found itself in a similar situation. No electronics. No GPS. No nothing! Imagine these young naval officers serenely sailing the seven seas, comfortable under the atmospheric protection of an array of electricallypowered, satellite-generated GPS signals when suddenly someone pulls the plug—either by equipment failure or cyber-attack.

My first thought was, "What an opportunity for our Squadron." I wondered if we could assist The Ohio State University Naval Reserve Officer Training Corp (NROTC.) Columbus Sail and Power had a history of turning to the OSU-NROTC Instructor cadre for speakers. This time we reached Lt. Luke Marshall, the surface warfare officer. I broached the idea of our Squadron providing specific celestial navigation training to his Middies. Lt. Marshall shared that he had just come off of a two-week celestial refresher course and he felt his midshipmen would benefit. During a planning meeting Lt. Marshall, Ralph and I decided that the best way to introduce the concept of 'old school' navigation would be a Noon Sight.


Working with the squadron's Junior Navigation husband and wife team of instructors, Ralph and Penny Newman, we were able to schedule two sessions with the Midshipmen



students. During the first session Dr. Newman presented a condensed version of the celestial triangle, the basics of celestial line of position, the concept of sea time and then the beauty and benefits of a Noon site.

Imagine presenting these navigation concepts to which we devote hours in JN classes in just minutes. Ralph's years as a family physician, and as a seasoned JN instructor, prepared him well for this challenging task. This first class finished by actually getting sextants into the students' hands. They took to it easily. Maybe all those hours spent playing video games prepared them well for mastering this instrument.

The second day found the Team of Ralph and Penny Newman leading the Middies to the grass in front of the iconic Ohio State football stadium known as The Horseshoe! There these young men and women began to work on a noon site. The squadron 'teachers' did just that. Teach. How to bring down the sun, how to 'rock' the sextant, how to call out for the time and to get



exclaimed. Lt. Marshall was everywhere during this time. Helping, encouraging, engaging. Then he led us to the classroom where our squadron's laptop computers had been positioned and we had the students enter their readings. We all smiled as we heard the hoots and howls as they discovered that they were at a dock in Havana, or just off the entrance to Halifax or even in (heaven forbid) Michigan!

Hopefully, by providing this little 'appetizer' on the simplicity and beauty of Celestial Navigation we have planted a seed for their future interest in this absolutely necessary skill set. A watch, a sextant, some tables and a pencil can show them the way home.

Observing from the back of the classroom it was heartening to see some of the Midshipmen students 'get it!' In their world of everything electronic where complexity rules the waves having the life-saving ability to determine one's position should be as common as downloading a NetFlix movie.

For us 'celestial navigation geeks' the pleasure of teaching students who have the potential to actually need it was invigorating. Imagine taking our theorical classroom concepts and principles and putting them to the real-world test. And as a taxpayer I was pleased that Lt. Marshall was willing to leverage our knowledge to supplement his curriculum. He exhibited all the qualities one would want in a Naval Officer and Instructor: an openness to our suggestion of helping; a willingness to expose his students to new ideas and concepts; his common-sense approach to using our Squadron's expertise to multiply what he was teaching. Hoist Bravo Zulu to the yardarm! A well done to him, to the Newmans, and to Columbus Sail and Power Squadron.

SAILING IN JAPAN AS TOLD BY CSPS MEMBER, NAHUM BURT

Hello from Japan!

In my last article I described how challenging it was to understand the rules concerning how to get involved in sailing in Japan. Well problem solved! The short answer is I went to a yacht club party and got invited back to go sailing! We have been staying busy and got some good sailing in...

The nearest popular sailing area from where I live in Utsunomiya is Enoshima in the city of Fujisawa, south of Yokohama. Enoshima is a rock island jutting out of the water just off the beach of Fujisawa. There is a causeway connecting the island to the city and the island is home to a shrine, caves and was the sailing venue for the 1964 Olympics. The marina will be the venue again when the Olympics return in 2020.

If I did not make it clear in the last article, my wife has been instrumental in making connections and maintaining the communication with the people we meet. I wanted to do a dock walk and find a ride for a race I found, so she called the Enoshima Yacht Club and found out that I can't just show up and find a ride for the regatta. But we did get invited to the party! So in late April we went to EYC and met a lot of nice people. Being the only foreigner in attendance also added to the intrigue. Of all the people we met, the most significant was Toshi Ooki. He is the EYC race director and when he's not running a race from the committee boat, he is also a competitor on his Avalon 25 (Australian built). We got talking and he invited us out for sailing during Japan's week long holiday in the spring called Golden Week. Ooki-san took us out with some of his friends and we got two great days of sailing in, going up and down the coast line.

The first day we headed east to Zushi city and the second day we went west and sailed around Eboshi Iwa, which is a small uninhabitable rock island. This little rock island did not look like much, but Ooki-san told us the Japanese military used it for artillery practice before WWII and there isn't a lot left....

The next event I got to participate in was a race! In late June, Ooki-san set me up on a Seem 33 (Japan built) named *Ariadne* for the Enoshima Cup race with a crew of six others. Fortunately, there was one guy that spoke some English! It was a really windy day and, since I didn't have an official job to do, I spent most of my time on the rail.



The funny part about me being rail meat, is that in the US, I did fore deck and any low-side work because I'm light. Well in Japan, I'm not light... I'm average. So, I became ballast until I have a real job assignment. Overall, the day was fun, with the wind holding steady around +20 knots. We had difficulty finding the upwind mark, which turned out to be a weather buoy that was being held down by the current. With the depth of the seabed being a couple hundred feet, the rode allowed the buoy to move around quite a bit and, combined with the current, only the antennas were viable. The other take away I had is that the argument about what course adjustment to do next is the same. Different language, but the discussions are the same. Thankfully, most of the boating terms are in English and as the crew discussed when to tack or what course to take, I could understand what was being discussed. I just could not understand what the detail of the discussion was. After the race we sat around on the boat enjoying drinks and snacks with many questions coming my way. Most of the crew did not know I would be participating and were just surprised to have a foreigner aboard. Thankfully, when my wife arrived to join the party, she got to answer and translate a lot of the interactions. Overall it was a good start to crewing on the boat.
